2021 Guidelines

The 2021 National Pest Surveillance Guidelines were published on April 22, 2020. The online work plan is due to be available around August 1, and will be required. If, however, the online work plan will not be ready for 2021, the Word templates are available as in previous years.

<u>All work plans for 2021 will be due on September 11</u>, and this will be a much harder deadline than last year. Last year the soft deadline turned into mush with a few States being very lax in sending in their work plans. December is not an appropriate time. This year the deadline needs to be much firmer.

A significant update to the Guidelines was the reduction in the number of pests and pathogens on the Priority Pest List. When planning surveys for 2021, please refer to the <u>Summary of Pest List</u> <u>Changes</u>, <u>Guidance for Bundling Former Priority Pests</u>, and <u>Bundling Former Priority Pests</u> (Excel File) for more detailed information.

CAPS Webinar

After discussion, it was decided that a CAPS Webinar on the 2021 Guidelines would be a good idea. A similar webinar was held last year that folks found useful, so we will do it again. The PDMT will work to schedule the webinar no later than mid-June, but with an ambitious date of late May in mind.

A webinar also is planned for early August on the new Ian Foley Online Work and Financial Plan. Stay tuned.

2020 Guidance Updates

<u>Phytoplasma guidance</u> has been posted on the Taxonomic Services page of the CAPS R&C site, and includes a list of 20 diagnostic labs in 18 states available for sample diagnostics. See <u>Phytoplasma Sample Screening and Confirmation</u>

<u>Contractual costs guidance</u> has been posted on the 2020 and 2021 Guidelines pages, and well as the 2020 PPA Goal 1 page of the CAPS R&C. This was discussed on the January 9, 2020, NCC call and appears in the minutes to that call. This document outlines when the contractual plan is needed and when it is not. 2020 PPA Goal 1 Survey Work Plans

Reminder that Goal 1 Survey work plans were due on May 1.

- Work plans should be uploaded to the PPQ Cooperative Agreements SharePoint site.
- The Survey Summary Form should be completed for all states that have Goal 1 Surveys.
- Please check the status of your <u>Survey Summary Form</u>. Some are still being entered by the SSC, some are waiting for SPHD approval, etc.
- The Survey Summary Form needs to be approved by the SPHD and the work plans need to be uploaded to SharePoint before work plans will be approved by the Pest Detection National Operations Manager.

*Note, there is a new feature for states who are not participating in PPA Goal 1 Surveys. On your Survey Summary Form, please check the box in the upper left hand corner that denotes "Not Participating" if your state is not receive funding for Goal 1 Surveys.

2020 PPA 7721

<u>July 31</u> is the deadline for having <u>all</u> PPA 7721 agreements signed and obligated. To achieve this, all work and financial plans need to be reviewed and approved by the ADODR, and uploaded to the Agreements SharePoint site by <u>June 26</u>, to give the agreements staff sufficient time to process the agreements.

The 2021 Implementation Plan is being prepared. Please read it when it is available before you develop and submit a suggestion.

The dates for the open period for accepting suggestions have not been determined as yet, but early July appears to be the tentative time for beginning the open period.

Survey Supplies

Paul Ijams has accepted another position, and John Crowe will backfill the survey supplies role until a permanent replacement is identified.

Plastic Lure Holder

There is an issue getting the lure holders from the normal supplier (COVID-related delay). We are exploring other ways to get the holders, including potentially making them at Moore Airbase. Shipping status

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CAPS Success Stories

The CAPS Program Review Team is looking for success stories. For example, a major success story is the detection of pale cyst nematode.

 On April 19, 2006, officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and the Idaho State Department of Agriculture (ISDA) announced the detection of Pale cyst nematode (PCN), a major pest of potato crops. This was the first detection of the pest in the United States. The detection was made by a CAPS survey of tare dirt at a Blackfoot, Idaho grading facility in April 2006. (from the PCN Knowledge Management Document)

If you have any success stories related to the CAPS program in your state, please share your story with John, Lisa, and Shelley. The success story can be a detection and the circumstances of the detection, be it either directly or indirectly related to the CAPS program or a survey, or even a non-detection with negative data that facilitated exports through a phytosanitary certificate. A short narrative/paragraph would very much be appreciated.
